Topic: Developing measures to improve the effectiveness of education in Syria



Good morning honorable chair and fellow delegates. On behalf of Xi Jinping and the people of this great country. This delegation would like to thank the chair for the invitation and encourages present delegates to discuss the topic of “Developing measures to improve the effectiveness of education in Syria”

The Syrian education system is going through a tough time, although education is a fundamental right that provides children and youth with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes needed to build their own future to develop their own voice it is becoming a rarity in Syria. In 2015, an estimated 2 million Syrian children were out of school; attacks on schools have been common since the conflict began, resulting in the damage or destruction of one-third of Syrian schools and the unemployment of almost 200,000 education workers. Actions have been taken to help Syrian children and the future economy of the country such as (NRC)'s education program, and UNICEF's actions with Save the Children and CapEd despite actions taken protection concerns, lack of learning spaces, economic hardship and displacement is still a threat to the parents.

China is firmly opposed to the use of chemical weapons and supports the U.N.'s chemical weapons inspectors and asking for a political solution for Syria. At the China-Arab States Cooperation Forum in January 2018, China announced a loan and aid package of \$23 billion for the Arab region, China has attempted to take a more active role in the Middle East with the upcoming project of starting ‘China’s Economic Belt and Maritime Silk Road Initiative’ which would not be possible if Syria continues to lower their economic status.

Developing measures to improve the effectiveness of education in Syria is crucial for the future economy and relationships of the country, that's why The People's Republic of China the next solutions:

- Radio schooled as an alternative program for out-of-school children, which would teach Syrian children the first 5 years of primary education, basic stationery would be provided for those who can't afford it, and the materials would be supported by the economic resources of NGOs and donations.
- Creation of a strategic plan, in case the political situation stabilizes, for the country to return to a normal and efficient education program as soon as possible.
- Provide adequate information and help to refugees and displaced citizens on how to travel safely and complete the range of steps to travel to the EU.

To conclude, The People's Republic of China is open to listening to any other solution and will gladly cooperate with fellow delegations to reach an efficient solution that benefits the international community.

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
